AGM 2016



On 3 May this year's AGM was well attended at Brisbane School of Distance Education, Coorparoo, and even a new school has joined ESAQ: the Yasodhara Sinhala School in West End. Esaq could welcome again Mr Joe Kelly, Member of Parliament for Greenslopes, who talked about his experience from Harmony Day. Multicultural Australia meant him that just like in music we all produce a harmonious music even though we do not look the same, or have the same thoughts. He believes, that especially now it is very important to keep in mind Australia's multicultural policy and live it every day: playing different notes but in harmony.

Two colleagues from the Department of Education and Training, Ms Betty Baram and Corinne School also attended ESAQ's AGM. Ms Betty Baram (State Schooling Operations and Strategy, Education Queensland) with the audience that Community Language Schools became the official name for After Hours Ethnic Schools. And she told 2016 in numbers: 32 Community Language Schools were funded, 4194 students that is 470 more students than last year, 39 student passed senior external exams, and 15 languages were taught at these schools – Arabic, Bangla, Chinese, Farsi, Filipino, Greek, Hindi, Hungarian, Japanese, Korean, Nepali, Samoan, Sinhala, Tamil, Vietnamese. She also suggested a cooperation with mainstream schools, that could contribute to their language teaching

Corinne Scholl continued Betty's talk with the very important piece of information that the Community Language Schools website will be ready this year, so online applications, logbooks etc. will be easier and more accessible for schools. She also emphasized the importance of a generic email address for each school, not connected to a certain person, just like that the bank account should be in the name of the school. Corinne underlined the importance of the requirements to be funded: current Blue Cards for any educational staff, and to be registered at the Australian Charities and not for Profits Commission. The online presence is really important these days, so Betty Baram suggested a Professional development in the area of website development on free platforms – Wix, or Wordpress for example. Thanks to the generous invitation of the Brisbane Chinese School and Ms Hu and Ms Qian, Irene, my daughter and I could enjoy a wonderful yum cha at the popular Landmark Restaurant at Sunnybank Plaza.

The cause for celebration was that the Brisbane Chinese School has found a new home for Term 2. The school was forced to leave their earlier premises, St Thomas More College at Sunnybank. The news of the move was quite sudden and the need for a new place for 1300 students was reallz pressing. ESAQ has written a support letter for the school and asked for recommendations from the Department of Education. Apart from these, the BCL has found its new premises at three campuses: Redeemer Lutheran College at Rochedale, Calamvale Community College at Calamvale and Indooroopilly State School at Indooroopilly

The school's co-principal Ms Hu, and the principal Ms Qia has talked about how China supports diaspora language schools. Besides supporting every students with textbooks, every year a handful of teachers has the opportunity to participate on a 2-week-teachers' training in China. Educators from China visit the school every year and lead an in situ training and expperience the challenges of language teaching in the diaspora. The students can attend different camps in China, as well as accompanied by teachers from their schools. Except the travel costs all of these programs are covered by the Chinese government.

SBS National Languages Competition

24 July - 1 September 2017

1. What is the SBS National Languages Competition?

The **SBS National Languages Competition 2017** is an exciting initiative to encourage and celebrate a love of learning languages in Australia. It's a nationwide competition to engage school children and reflect on the cultural, linguistic and ethnic diversity of Australia's multicultural society.

SBS Radio encourages all school students across Australia, to participate in the 'SBS National Languages Competition' by telling us in a 30 second video 'What learning a language means to you?', in any language other than English.

The competition is open to all school students aged 4 to 18 years, who are learning a language other than English.

Competition entries are open from 9:00am on Monday 24 July 2017 (AEST) until Midnight on Friday 1 September 2017 (AEST).

2. How to enter?

Given the diversity of ages and skills, we encourage parents, guardians and school teachers to guide the entrants where needed, in uploading their video and filling out an entry form. This year, all school students must enter the SBS National Languages Competition 2017 online by going to sbs.com.au/NLC17

2 There can only be one submission per entrant. Participants cannot enter in groups

3. What do participants win?

There will be four grand prize winners (one from each age category) who will receive: 2 iPad Pro 12.9 inch 256GB for the winner and one for his/her school

2 Full days pass to Luna Park in Sydney for two

Winners will also be invited to attend the SBS National Languages Competition award ceremony at SBS headquarters in Sydney to be held in October 2017.

Selected winners who do not reside in NSW at the time of the above award ceremony will receive return airfares (for them and a parent/ guardian) from their capital city and one night's accommodation in Sydney to attend the ceremony.

Category B: Primary (Aged 8 – 12)

Category C: Junior High School (Aged 13 – 15) Category D: Senior High School (Aged 16 – 18)

Celebrating Multicultural Queensland Grants Program

The Celebrating Multicultural Queensland Grants Program funds initiatives that celebrate and promote Queensland's multicultural identity, increase community awareness of benefits of multiculturalism, foster community cohesion, and support equal access to opportunities by people from diverse cultural backgrounds.

In 2017-18 total funding of \$1 million will be allocated to diverse multicultural events and projects across Queensland through 2 separate grants rounds:

- Multicultural Events open from 18 July to 29 August 2017
- Multicultural Projects opening later in 2017.

What is Queensland Day?

Queensland Day is an annual celebration of the state's birthday on 6 June and acknowledges the 'birth' of Queensland in 1851 as a separate colony in its own right. It is an annual celebration of the state's culture, heritage, people and industry.

In celebrating Queensland Day, the community can share a sense of pride in being both Australian and a Queenslander. It is a time to reflect on how lucky we are to be part of such a wonderful lifestyle.

What is the program?

The program allocates sponsorships of up to \$10,000 per event for organisations and community groups to plan and host their own Queensland Day events between Saturday 2 and Sunday 10 June 2018.

Easy grants Bank west - ongoing

The first 20 Easy Grant applications received each month that meet the entry criteria will be up for public vote. If your application falls beyond the first 20 received, it will be automatically included in the next available month's voting period.

Awarding the grants: Everyone can vote on a monthly basis for the community group you think should receive a grant. The three groups with the highest number of votes will receive \$1,000 each. The remaining groups will receive \$200 each.

Voting Periods: Voting runs for one month starting from the first Monday of each month, and closing on the last Thursday of each month. Check out the timeline below for more information
